Pier 62/63 is surrounded by water on three sides offering spectacular water and mountain views. The rebuilt pier will be a place to stroll, enjoy views, and play with open space for activities like soccer, and direct water access via a floating dock. Flexible event space will host activities including concerts and markets.

With the removal of the viaduct, elevated overlooks, spaces and places along the waterfront are being created for the public to enjoy the breathtaking views of Elliott Bay, Puget Sound, Mount Rainier, and Olympic Mountains.

Overlook Walk will be a public plaza and viewing deck connecting the urban core and Pike Place MarketFront to the future waterfront. The fully accessible walkway is a beautiful park within a park, offering integrated gardens, children's play areas, and elevated views of Elliott Bay, Puget Sound, Mount Rainier, and the Olympic Mountains.
